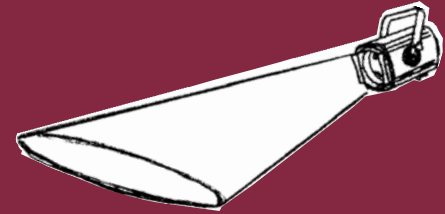

Faculty Spotlight: Mark Konty



Dr. Mark Konty received a BA from Texas Tech University in Communications in 1991, an MA from Texas Tech University in Sociology in 1996, and a PhD from the University of Arizona in 2002.

He was an assistant professor in the sociology department at Washington State University from 2001-2005. He then was an assistant professor of criminology and criminal justice at Auburn University from 2005-2007. He now teaches statistics, social control and the social psychology of justice here at Eastern Kentucky University.

Dr. Konty has recent publications in the journals "Criminology", "Deviant Behavior", and "Sociological Spectrum". He is currently conducting research on the cross-cultural differences in how values effect crime and deviant behavior. He is also conducting new research on social control which includes issues such as: how does society control social control agents; the social control of the coal industry in Kentucky; the effects of social control on illegal immigrant populations; and the social construction of the gun control debate.

New Scholarship Available For Police Studies Majors

The Billy Oates Memorial Scholarship provides a one-time annual award of \$1,000 to a student fitting the following criteria:

- A full-time Bachelor of Science degree seeking student at Eastern Kentucky University in good academic standing;
- A Police Studies major within the University's College of Justice and Safety;
- A graduate of a Jefferson County, Kentucky high school or an individual who is classified by the University as having a permanent home address within Jefferson County, Kentucky;
- A junior or senior level student for the fall, 2008 semester.

To apply, students must:

1. Pick up an application form from Jennifer Goins in Stratton 354 and complete an essay expressing why you wish to pursue a career in Law Enforcement.
2. Submit a list of community service and co-curricular activities.
3. Submit a copy of High School Transcript if you transferred to ECU with 24 credit hours or more

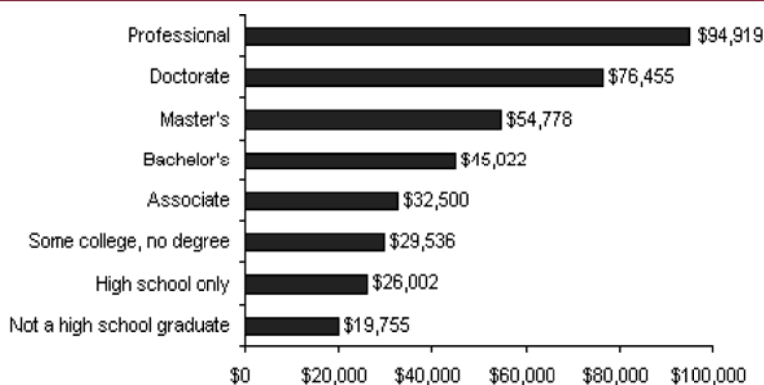

CAREER OPPORTUNITIES FOR THOSE WITH ADVANCED DEGREES

Almost every job within the criminal justice and police studies field requires at least a bachelor's degree or higher. Only jobs within policing will consider applicants with only a high school diploma, but most require at least a two-year degree. Every job will pay more if the candidate has a Master's degree. The following is a list of job experience/education required for various jobs within the criminal justice field.

POLICE OFFICER: Smaller departments and sheriff's offices may only require a high school diploma, but many require at least an associate's degree. Larger cities and communities often require a four-year degree in criminal justice. As crime rates continue to increase nationwide, police officers and sheriff's deputies will be increasingly needed.

PROBATION AND PAROLE OFFICER: A bachelor's degree in social work, criminal justice, psychology, or a related field is usually required. Some employers require a master's degree in criminal justice, social work, psychology, or a related field for candidates who do not have previous related experience. Employment of probation and parole officers is projected to grow 11 percent between 2006 and 2016 (94,000 to 105,000 jobs). The middle 50 percent of probation and parole officers earned between \$33,880 and \$56,280.

IMMIGRATION AND CUSTOMS ENFORCEMENT (ICE): Applicants must possess one year of specialized experience that equips them to perform the job duties or have successfully completed a bachelor's degree.

BORDER PATROL AGENT: To qualify for a GL-5 position applicants must have experience in law enforcement or have successfully completed a bachelor's degree. To qualify for a GL-7 position applicants must meet the basic entry qualification requirements for the GI-5 position plus have superior academic achievement, or one year of graduate level education. GL-5 (\$35,595) GL-7 (\$40,519).

CIA ANALYST: Requires a bachelor's degree with a GPA of 3.0 or higher. A master's degree, relevant work experience, or foreign language capability is desired but not required. (\$44,465-\$86,801). **SECURITY PROTECTIVE OFFICER:** Must have a high school diploma or equivalent; however prior military, police or security experience is preferred. An associate's or bachelor's degree, in Criminal Justice or a related field, from an accredited college or university will be accepted in lieu of extensive experience. (\$44,867-\$48,320).

U.S. MARSHALS: Must have a bachelor's degree or three years of qualifying experience, or an equivalent combination of education and experience for GS-5. For GS-7, applicants must have a bachelor's degree and a GPA of 3.0 or higher for all completed undergraduate courses, or successful completion of graduate education related to law such as criminal justice.

F.B.I.: Applicants must possess a four-year degree. (\$43,441).

Criminal Justice/Criminology Jobs

Criminal Justice/Criminology Jobs including qualifications required and who employs criminologists:

What is Criminal Justice/Criminology?

It is the scientific study of the criminal justice system and processes, crime, criminals, criminal behavior and corrections. It also studies societies' response to crime and to prevention. This includes examination of evidence, hereditary and psychological causes of crime, different modes of investigation and conviction and efficiency of punishment and corrections.

What is a Criminal Justice graduate/Criminologist and what do they do?

They study normal social behaviors and deviations from the norm. They are often an academic who studies crime and the law. They provide theoretical explanations of delinquent and criminal behavior, analyze criminal law and criminal behavior.

They analyze the entire criminal justice system and its processes. They study crime by analyzing criminal behavior and methods of criminals. They work with and for law enforcement agencies developing profiles of particular types of crimes as well as gathering statistics on crime rates.

What do qualifications do criminal justice practitioner/criminologists generally need?

They need an interest in human well-being and behavior. A good practitioner/professional is also a good communicator and listener. They need to demonstrate responsibility, creativity, analytical thinking and problem-solving.

The good practitioner/professional need research and computer skills, integrity and an interest in socially disadvantaged individuals. Criminologists need a degree in the criminal justice field, preferably with a minor in psychology or sociology

What do criminal justice/criminologists study in their courses?

Undergraduate courses include government, sociology, psychology, criminal law, constitutional law and criminal theory. Additional coursework might include foreign language, juvenile delinquency, forensics, abnormal psychology, corrections, research methods and statistics. Coursework should include statistics, writing, computer literacy, and critical thinking. Advanced degrees are necessary for those who choose to teach or conduct professional research or for professional advancement.

What types of tasks may criminal justice/criminologists do in their job?

Entry-level jobs include data collection, report proofing, and computer work, catalogue information about the possible causes of crime and the crimes committed, compile crime statistics and propose improvements for the use of resources. They also analyze and develop crime prevention strategies.

Practitioners analyze the causes of crime and how the community relates to crime. They may be involved in crime scene investigations, or attend autopsies seeking evidence and information to analyze the crime.

What areas of specialization may criminologists choose?

They may focus on specific age groups, or specific types of crimes. Or, they may focus on crime prevention, the process of crime scene investigation, the process of criminal litigation or the process of criminal corrections. They may become a profiler who develops profiles of particular criminal activity by reviewing patterns of behavior among certain groups who commit particular crimes or a special analyst examining geographic patterns of crime.

They may specialize in organizational research, victimology, corporate crime or juvenile justice. Some criminologists work with community initiatives, evaluation and policy projects with federal, state and local criminal justice agencies.

What types of companies employ criminal justice/criminologists?

Universities and government agencies employ graduates in these areas for advanced teaching and research and policy assessment.

Many graduates become police officers, FBI agents, or state medical examiners. They may work in universities teaching criminology, legal studies, law and sociology Federal and state justice agencies employ them as research officers and policy advisers.

They are found in many different settings: airport security, corrections systems, probation or parole officers, drug enforcement agencies, FBI, US customs and other law enforcement agencies. Corporations or financial institutions, major department stores and law firms employ security officers, private investigators or social workers. Some work as consultants in the role of private investigators or security.
